Before you read the story, explain

 The Pharisees were a group of Jews who studied God's law and thought that they kept all God's rules! They were proud and had high opinions of themselves.

- Tax collectors were hated not only because they collected money from the Jewish people for the Roman government, but because they also stole money by collecting more than required, keeping it for themselves!
- Jesus had 12 disciples. Disciples are people who spend a lot of time with a leader; being influenced by his teachings and trying to follow his example by modelling their lives after him!

Do's and Do Not's

- Do let the Holy Spirit be the teacher.
- Do remember to study for obedience rather than for knowledge!
- **Don't** dominate the conversation; encourage everyone to participate. Facilitator = 30%, Participants = 70%
- · Don't demand correct answers.
- Don't get distracted, stay on topic.
- Don't be afraid to say "I don't know the answer, I'll get back to you."

The Parable of the Pharisee and the Tax Collector

Luke 18:9-14 (NLT)

9 Then Jesus told this story to some who had great confidence in their own righteousness and scorned everyone else: 10 "Two men went to the Temple to pray. One was a Pharisee, and the other was a despised tax collector. 11 The Pharisee stood by himself and prayed this prayer: 'I thank you, God, that I am not like other people—cheaters, sinners, adulterers. I'm certainly not like that tax collector! 12 I fast twice a week, and I give you a tenth of my income.'

13 "But the tax collector stood at a distance and dared not even lift his eyes to heaven as he prayed.
